"Taste, i.e. consider it seriously, and thoroughly, and affectionately; make
trial of it by your own and others'" (Poole)
 The word "desire" in the Septuagint Bible is a very strong word
describing man's longing for the LORD. 1 Peter 2:2-3
When we trust and revere the LORD, He will provide all we need, and we $$
will not have to anything or anybody else. <i>Matthew 6:33</i>
III. The LORD resists evil people. Psalm 34:11-16
"As David describes the fear of the LORD , it is rooted in action, not
religious The fear of the Lord is doing right, that is, that it
involves obedience." (Boice)
 Serving the Lord has trials and hardships, but ultimately, we find
joy, peace, and in life by living for Him.
"The verb, "resists" vividly pictures God as one who places Himself in
array against such individuals." (Hiebert) 1 Peter 5:5-6
IV. The LORD is near to the brokenhearted. Psalm 34:17-18
The LORD is of the pain that arises from our experiences. He is
always available and close to those who suffer, and not surprised or
disappointed with His broken saints.
 The enemy would love to keep us from experiencing the LORD's
deep love for us, which provides us with peace and strength to
endure times of
