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I. The first commandment. Mark 12:28-31

- The Scribes came to Jesus with this question, again trying to test Him. For centuries the religious leaders had debated what was the most _____ commandment. **Deuteronomy 6:4-5**

II. You are close to the truth. Mark 12:32-34

Jesus healed people, forgave sins, raised the dead, healed the blind, and many times claimed to be One with the Father, making Himself _____ with God.

- If Judah's heart wasn't changed, humbled, and surrendered to the Lord, it made no difference what they offered God. Without the right heart, God _____ their religious ceremony and service.

III. Messiah is Lord. Mark 12:35-37

3. Read **Mark 12:35-37** and **Psalms 110:1**. Discuss the definition of the words YHWH and Adonai. How did Jesus show Himself to be God through these verses. How was the Messiah both the Son of David and the Son of God? **Jeremiah 23:5-6, Revelation 22:16, John 5:18, Philippians 2:5-8, Mark 4:41**
4. Read **Matthew 22:45-46**. Discuss the statement from the sermon, "After the religious leaders had asked several questions and Jesus answered them all without any room for argument; they have nothing to refute His claims, and nothing left to say to Him." **Mark 15:12, Luke 4:34, Joshua 24:15**
