The theme of <i>Mark</i> is to make known Jesus as the Suffering King.
I. Introduction to the Gospel of Mark.
Mark was with Peter while Peter spent his last years in the city of Rome; in
fact, Peter calls Mark his 1 Peter 5:13
• Early on in the history of the Church, it was believed that John
Mark wrote the Apostle account of the events that

III. John the Baptizer. Mark 1:4-8
Repentance boils down to one thing: a We agree with the
Lord about our sinful behavior; we turn from our sin and turn to the Lord
instead. It's a 180 degree turn from sin to God.
 For Christians today, we are to practice what is known as a
baptism, where we identify with Christ's death,
burial, and resurrection by being immersed in water.
Even though a Rabbi could ask a student to do anything except take off
their sandals - because that was even to ask of a slave -
John says he was not worthy to loosen Jesus' sandals.
IV. John baptizes Jesus. Mark 1:9-11
Jesus went through John's baptism to identify with man, not because He
needed to repent, but because His mission was to do the will of the Father
and to with, and save, sinful man. 2 Corinthians 5:21
 When Mark says Jesus saw the heavens opened, he used the vivid

word *schizō*, which means to divide, _____ open, or rend.
