Looking back at your notes from this week's sermon, was there anything that particularly caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?

- 1. Read *Luke 2:1-7*. Discuss how difficult the journey would have been for Jospeh and Mary. Why did Mary go with Joseph for the journey back to Bethlehem?
- 2. Mary and Joseph may not have planned on having their baby on the night they arrived in Bethlehem, but God's timing is always perfect. How do we tend to react when things don't go according to our plans? Do you struggle trusting God's timing? Proverbs 3:5-6, Proverbs 16:9, 2 Peter 3:8-9
- 3. The question was asked, "Will you make room for Jesus in your heart and life?" This means He is Savior and Lord. How would you answer that question? After you accept Jesus as your Savior do you still need to make room for Him in your life? Jeremiah 29:11, Romans 10:9-10, Romans 12:1-2
- 4. Read Luke 2:8-9. Describe what shepherds looked like in biblical times. What is significant about shepherds being greatly afraid? 1 Samuel 17:32-37, Psalm 91:11, John 10:11, Hebrews 12:22
- 5. Read Luke 2:10-14. We read the angel brought "good tidings of great joy which will be to all people." Discuss the good news and how that relates to how the world views the Gospel. Do they see it as good news?
- 6. Read Luke 2:15-18. When the shepherds hear the good news, they do something about it. Discuss how faith is an action word, not just an intellectual belief.
